

GeoEd

Present day technology has the ability to facilitate so many things that it's sometimes hard to comprehend how fast it moves along. This is one of the reasons that professional associations across Canada and the globe have started to move towards Mandatory Professional Development, but it also gives us the opportunity to prove how easy it is to access the necessary material.

GeoEd is a collaborative program that seeks to include all provincial and federal surveying associations in Canada to promote accessible continuing professional development. The initiative was conceived and developed by the ACLS (Association of Canada Lands Surveyors) when it recognized the need of a national forum for CPD. ACLS continues to maintain the portal in what will hopefully become a cooperative effort to share resources and expertise towards the development of national learning.

Part of this is initiative is a forum that anyone can register in at <u>www.geoed.ca/forum</u>. Here you can search by jurisdiction to find seminars that are happening near you, as well as post upcoming ones for others to find. You can chat to surveyors across Canada about seminars you have attended and what sort of seminars you would like to see in the future. Using the forum insures that every person can have a voice in how future CPD opportunities develop. Although the forum is an important part of GeoEd, it isn't the most exciting part. GeoEd is currently constructing an online system for course delivery! This means that there will be full courses on a variety of topics that will be available at your fingertips. These courses will occasionally consist of live, interactive webinars, but will mostly be courses that are fully self-study with recorded video and other digital materials. Surveyors will be able to sign up for any course and complete it at their leisure.

GeoEd recently launched the first of many paid trainings. A one hour course on the principles of GNSS positioning was presented by Dr. Robert Radovanovic to 80 participants. Each participant paid \$67.80, but a satisfaction survey afterwards should and overwhelming percentage found the course to be very worthwhile and informative. GeoEd will be continuing this sort of courses.

Currently available through GeoEd is a free 30 minute course that focuses on How to do Business with the Federal Government. It will talk you through how best to use the online system MERX and SELECT, as well as how to bid on proposals and make sure your bid is considered.

Some upcoming courses that will be available soon are: Introduction on how to make comprehensive Field Notes, and the Expert Witness course which was a hit with BC land surveyors at a recent ABCLS AGM.

Mandatory Continuing Professional Development (MCPD) for 2011

The ACLS Mandatory Continuing Professional Development bylaw section came into effect on January 1st, 2011, so all ACLS license holders have to cumulate at least 45 hours of relevant CPD over the three year cycle ending on December 31st, 2013. A prorated formula will be applied for members being awarded a licence after July 1st, 2011.

The bylaw section does not require that licence holders have CPD hours in each and every year of the cycle but does require that a MCPD report is provided to the ACLS for licences to be renewed. The only way to submit a MCPD report is through the ACLS Web based MCPD Tracking System. This system is simple and straightforward. Members not aware of their user name and password to access the members only section of the Web site just need to send an e-mail to communications@acls-aatc.ca

Please note that members who did not attend any CPD events in 2011 must use the MCPD Tracking System to input an events called "No CPD hours in 2011" with zero hours.

MyCLSS

We are glad to report that the MyCLSS system is working very well. We get very few requests for help. Most requests are from members who had login issues (forgot their password, did not receive the e-mail containing the login information). On February 1, 2012 a total of 350 checklists have been created. We are getting calls from some of our sister associations who are looking for an electronic checklist system.

It is our intention to improve it every year. We recently implemented the following enhancements:

- Members can now reset their password themselves
- When a checklist is submitted, the system will stay in checklist window as opposed to going to the My Projects page
- Members working for entities with branch offices will be able to select the invoicing address and the correct tax will be added.
- The system will display up to 10 projects per page in the My Projects panel
- Internet Explorer 9 and Fire Fox 7.0.1 browsers are now supported
- Members will be able to upload up to 10 MB of supporting documents when requesting survey instructions and when uploading pdf copies of plans after submitting checklists.

The ACLS now has access to an administrative module that will allow it to:

- reset members passwords
- obtain copies of checklists and pdf copies of plans from the MyCLSS database

We have not yet decided what enhancements will be done this year. We have received ideas from some members. Again this year, we will have to prioritize.

A reminder for those who never used it; go to the "Help" page of the MyCLSS Web site and familiarize yourself with the system by reading the Instructions Manual, the 2 PowerPoint presentations and more. Do not try to "wing it"; it is a complex system.

The ACLS has a new on-line, on-demand Web based exam system to allow those candidates who have a provincial surveying commission to earn a Commission as a Canada Lands Surveyor. All candidates are required to write a 4 hour professional exam incorporating the following subjects:

- Acts, Regulations and General Instructions for Surveys
- Property Rights on-shore
- Property Rights offshore
- Aboriginal Government Issues

As of February 28, 2012, 3 exams have been written and 2 were successfully passed.
